# The Affordable Care Act: Putting Delivery System Reform in Context

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### Where We Were: Our Broken Health System

- Rising Health Insurance Premiums: Family premiums for employer coverage increased from nearly \$6,000 to over \$13,000 between 1999 and 2009.
- **Drain on the Economy:** Health spending increased as a percent of GDP from 14 to nearly 18 percent from 1999 to 2009.
- Low Scores on Key Health Indicators: U.S. lags on infant mortality, obesity, and health system performance.
- Loss in Employer Coverage: The percent of employers offering health coverage fell from 66 to 60 percent from 1999 to 2009.
- **Growing number of Uninsured:** Close to 50 million uninsured in 2009.
- Concentrated Health Markets: Individuals and small employers experience highest premium increases, and many markets dominated by one or two major insurers.

## Mrs. Jones' Care: Before the Affordable Care Act

- Medical history is recorded on paper
- Not all the preventive tests she needs are covered
- Doctors don't talk to each other
- Not all doctors have access to her full history
- She can't afford all of her medications
- Gets an infection while staying in the hospital

### The Affordable Care Act

- Builds on the existing health care system to expand access to affordable coverage
- Creates more competitive and transparent health care markets
- Reforms the health insurance market and holds insurers accountable
- Strong emphasis on administrative simplification and efforts to reduce waste, fraud and abuse
- Focus on prevention and wellness
- Incentives for quality improvement and delivery system reform to lower costs

## Implementation in Three Phases

#### Phase I – 2010

- Stabilization of existing coverage
- Down-payment on insurance market reforms
- Patient's Bill of Rights

#### Phase II – 2011-2014

- "Build phase" for Exchanges
- > Delivery system reform

### Phase III – 2014 and beyond

- Full implementation of insurance market reforms
- Exchanges go "live"
- Premium tax credits and cost sharing assistance
- Medicaid expansion

## Phase II: Delivery System Reform

#### Accountable Care Organizations (ACOs)

- Shared savings payment model to promote accountability
- Pioneer ACOs and Advance Payment Initiative
- Encourages investment in infrastructure and redesign health care delivery for improved quality

#### Other Delivery System Reform Initiatives

- Reducing hospital acquired conditions and avoidable readmissions
- Hospital value-based purchasing

#### Center for Medicare and Medicaid Innovation

- Partnership for Patients
- State demonstrations to integrate care for dual eligibles
- Medicaid health home State plan option
- Medicare bundled payments
- Comprehensive Primary Care initiative
- \$1 billion Health Care Innovation Challenge
- Program to reduce preterm births


## **Care Improvement Continuum**



## Mrs. Jones' Care: After the Affordable Care Act

- Annual checkup covered by Medicare
- Recommended preventive screenings provided without cost sharing
- Electronic medical records
- Lower prescription drug costs
